Sewa Medical Camp - Free Health Screening

Central Jersey Chapter of Sewa International, USA conducted its first ever Medical Camp – a Free Health Screening Camp in the month of February, 2023.

Central Jersey Chapter Coordinator Rajesh Ji Sharma, Head Coordinator Ritesh Ji Maheshwari and Family Services Lead Selvaraj Ji Mudaliyar planned, organized and managed the camp assisted by chapter adult volunteers and Family Services volunteers.

It was an event which entailed months of planning which involved multiple calls with the Doctors, setting up the proper wellness screening stations, setting up online registrations for patients, designing flyers, outreach to partner organizations, social media event promotion, setting up and coordinating with the Lab for the blood work for registered patients, helpline calls to all registered patients and sending out vouchers for blood work, providing waiver forms, and ensuring all health information captured was protected and all measures were taken to ensure it was all in compliance with U.S. Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).



The Chapter partnered with Purpose LLC for the use of their large facility to conduct the camp, Avantic Medical Lab, Edison to provide free blood work to registered participants prior to their health screening, and Linden Pharmacy to provide free medical supplies and glucose meters needed on site.

Dr. Vivek Bansal – Endocrinologist, Dr. Deepali Prasad – Nephrologist, and Dr. Nikita Varshney – Cardiovascular Medicine, screened the patients using the blood work reports and tests performed at the camp. The Doctors were accompanied by their office assistants to help at the camp too.

The Doctors conducted an information session with the chapter volunteers to educate and train them on the proper procedures to be taken in recording the patients' numbers from their testing.

Young Sewa LEADs also helped in the setup and assisted at the camp in registering patients, recording BMI with height, weight measurements, monitoring blood pressure, and enabling the camp to run in a well-organized and efficient manner for the Doctors and the registered patients. For the LEADs and the adult volunteers this was a wonderful opportunity to learn these lifesaving skills.



The camp was a success with ~ 90 registrations with 40 of those pre-registered having got their blood work done at no cost. There were also many walk-in patients who heard of the camp through word of mouth positive feedback. The patients were given informative material, and where needed patients were also provided with OneTouch Glucose Meters and Test Strips for Self-Monitoring their blood glucose.





The Chapter sincerely appreciates the Doctors, their office assistants, and partner organizations Purpose LLC, Avantic Medical Lab, and Linden Pharmacy who facilitated this free health screening camp and also would like to thank all individuals who registered for the camp.

The patients were all unanimous in their positive feedback right from finding the flyers posted at various places across towns, smooth registration process, receiving calls from Sewa volunteers to enable the blood work, and being well taken care of at Avantic Medical Lab for their blood work. They appreciate the personalized treatment and medical advice on diet and wellness given by the Doctors, the health kit provided by Linden Pharmacy and went further on to mention they appreciated the onsite facility provided by Purpose LLC and how well they were taken care of by the Sewa volunteers at the camp!

The Chapter appreciates the volunteers and LEADs who stepped up to run this free health screening camp – the first ever by the Central Jersey Chapter!

The Chapter would like to thank Sujata Ji Mittal who coordinated between the chapter and the Doctors to conduct the camp, Shanta Ji Ravi who organized the homemade hot lunch for all Doctors, assistants and volunteers on site, and Subbaiah Ji Muthu Krishnan who captured photos and videos of the event.

Sewa Plastic Bag Recycling Drive Kickoff

Every day, thousands of non-recyclable materials are unknowingly put in recycling bins, clogging recycling machinery and causing operational problems, facility shutdowns, and safety hazards to employees. A large majority of these non-recyclable materials are plastic bags, shrink wrap, and other forms of plastic film.

As they cannot be recycled in curb-side recycling, the Central Jersey Chapter, in partnership with Crosswicks library of Chesterfield Township, Burlington County, NJ has organized a plastic bag recycling drive.

From now through May 31st, residents can drop off plastic bags & films at the drop off locations setup by the chapter.



If more than **500** pounds of plastics are collected in the drive, the chapter would have enabled the Crosswicks library to get a bench from Trex - a company that manufactures eco-friendly composite decks from a blend of reclaimed wood and recycled plastic film - which will be installed at the library.

The Central Jersey Chapter is always striving to seek opportunities to better communities across townships in NJ. In 2022, the chapter had conducted a plastic recycling drive, and on a successful drive had ensured a bench being donated to Chesterfield township! The Chapter then went further to enable the township by designing and creating a flyer to be put up on the township's official website, and to be distributed to all the residents in the township, to educate residents and bring about awareness on the importance of following the recycling procedure.

The Chapter encourages everyone to reduce the usage of the plastic bags wherever possible and also, make sure to recycle the used plastics in the right manner.

Sewa Educational Seminar: Energy, Electricity and Nuclear

Central Jersey Chapter LEADs attended an Educational Seminar on Energy, Electricity, and Nuclear. The seminar was well attended with around 78 LEADs joining in.

The Seminar was very informative, and in some instances an eye-opener for the young LEADs. The seminar was about climate change impact based on energy and electricity sources, the initiatives and progress in powering, the future of clean energy, and they also learnt about the internship and career opportunities in the energy field. The seminar ended with a very interactive Q&A session.

The LEADs learnt about different forms of energy, their effect on the environment, the pros and cons of nuclear energy, and also how it can be used to benefit people. They got an insight into nuclear power plants and the science behind them, and how electricity travels from the plant to our homes. They also learnt how the world is moving from fossil resources to nuclear to generate power and how though it's a costly option bur an effective one. The seminar cleared some misconceptions and LEADs also learnt some interesting trivia like how white cloudy emissions from a nuclear power plant is just vapor and not any harmful gasses.

The seminar triggered further interest in the LEADs which led them to look up on more information on the subject matter. LEADs also got a glimpse into the possibilities of considering nuclear engineering for their undergraduate program and as a career option.

The LEADS found the seminar to be educational, interactive and fun!

Sewa LEADs' Hand Crafted Jewelry for Fundraising

Central Jersey Chapter LEADS every year look for creative ways to raise funds for 'Sponsor a Child' – SAC, for the Sanitation, Hygiene and Empowerment Project for the Girl Child – SHE program, and for the SewaMeals program.

'SAC' is a flagship program of Sewa International USA that was launched in 2013. This program seeks to provide education, cultural training, and opportunities to improve the health and wellbeing of underprivileged children in India and Nepal. The beneficiaries of the program have increased over the years across the 2 countries.

The 'SHE' project for the girl child was conceived to provide sanitation and hygiene facilities for underprivileged girls who belong to vulnerable sections of Indian society. Along with sanitation facilities, the program focuses on menstrual hygiene, education, and empowering women and girl child through skill development workshops.

The SewaMeals is a flagship self-sustained program of the Central Jersey Chapter which was initiated in 2020, where the youth volunteers cook homemade meals for the homeless, food shelters, and food pantries across townships in NJ in order to provide consistent access to adequate food for the food insecure.

The Chapter LEADs this month of February 2023 designed and crafted bracelets, necklaces, and earrings using beads, and other materials. The LEADs made ~3000 pieces of hand crafted beautiful and professionally made jewelry which were unique in design and style - truly commendable and impressive!

It was an opportunity for the LEADs to be at their dedicated, creative best, and it also gave the high school LEADs a way to quietly be immersed in a task which gave their young minds the rest they needed.





LEADs are next eagerly looking forward to selling these well-made durable jewelries in the spring, summer, and fall fairs in the coming year where they will set up a Sewa International booth to sell these beautifully made items and also give them an opportunity to talk about Sewa International and all its humanitarian causes.

Sewa for 'Habitat for Humanity'

This month of February 2023 too, Central Jersey Sewa LEADs continued with their volunteering efforts at Habitat for Humanity in the endeavor to improve living conditions and to provide affordable and safe homes for low-income and historically underserved families from accessing adequate, affordable shelter.

When it comes to Habitat ReStores, managed by Habitat for Humanity, stores can get quickly disorganized, with customers hunting for all sorts of interior fixtures for their homes. Hence there is a need to have the Sewa LEADs help out at the Habitat ReStore facility in Maple Shade, NJ with reorganizing the store. The LEADs assisted by reorganizing rugs, restoring certain products to their original places, stocking new items to their respective shelves, and more.



Sewa for Boat Building for River Transport



The LEADs have continued to work with the Lower Raritan Watershed in their boat building project, which aims to create cedar wood boats completely from scratch. Their goal is to eventually provide free transportation via boats for public use, and they hope that their efforts will help motivate people to get more in touch with nature as they engage in fun excursions on the Raritan river.

By providing major hands-on experiences and knowledge about the physics of boat-building, this project excels at teaching LEADs new lessons as well as giving back to the community. The focus of the LEADs this month, essentially gluing together cedar strips and applying prolonged pressure to shape the wood along the boat's structure, is a crucial step in the boat-building process.

It's amazing to see how the LEADs are learning new skills while also contributing to a worthwhile cause.

Sewa at Temple

This month LEADs came together and assisted the staff of the Radha Gopinath Temple with their tasks, such as cooking, dishwashing, meal preparation, and cleaning the temple.

By doing so, they have not only lightened the workload for the staff but also contributed to maintaining the cleanliness and sanctity of the temple. The LEADs did an excellent job in assisting the staff, and we sincerely thank them for their time and effort.



SewaMeals for those in Need

The Central Jersey LEADs continued with their service of providing homemade, healthy meals for the homeless, food shelters, and food pantries, in order to provide consistent access to adequate food for the food insecure and thus enabling them to live healthy, active lives.

This month of February 2023, the LEADs volunteered to prepare 44 meal kits consisting of PBJ sandwiches, chips, granola bars, water bottles, and bananas. The Sewa LEADs wanted to provide tasty nourishing meals for those in need. The PBJ sandwiches were packaged in zip lock bags which were then placed into a paper bag with the other meal items in order to keep all of it fresh.

Chapter LEADs also prepared hot home cooked meals to feed ~350. They prepared salad, pita bread, hummus, marinara pasta, roasted veggies, mexican rice, black beans, pico de gallo, lettuce, and veggie fajitas. Dessert made was red velvet cake, and muffins.

The LEADs prepared the meals, packed them, and delivered them to the recipient churches, food pantries, and food shelters and further helped in packaging individual meals and in distributing the meals to the food insecure.

Chapter LEADs also volunteered at Franklin Township Food Bank on Thursdays and Saturdays throughout February.


They assisted in bagging, sorting, and stocking the produce, as well as worked at the register. They also helped the local community with their shopping.
