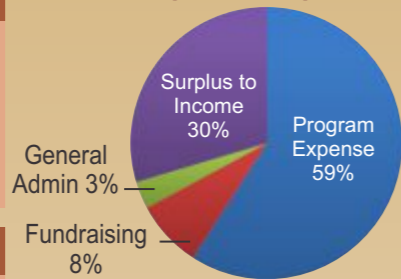

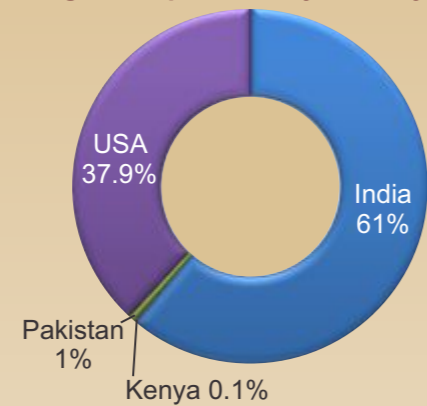

## Income-Expense-Surplus Ratios



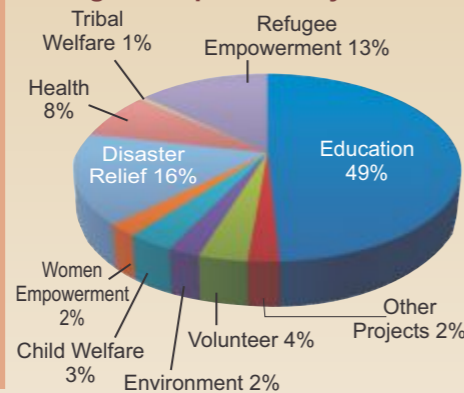

**Sponsor a Child** project in India serves children of the low income families through fees, uniforms, books, subject coaching, career guidance and counseling. Children of the invisible poor (maidservants, taxi/auto drivers, construction workers, vegetable vendors etc.) will benefit.

## Sewa's Flagship US project

**Family Services** project, jointly with ICC, Boston, provides help for immigrants during medical emergencies, death, distress, mental health, marriage counseling or, domestic abuse situations. Support includes a helpline, information repository and a bank of local volunteers. With a successful pilot in Houston and the Bay Area we are expanding it to other US cities.



A yoga wellness initiative **Stop Diabetes Movement** with SVYASA University, Bengaluru, India is in the works.



**Arogya Mitra** or "Village Health Worker" project runs in 4,000 villages across the seven states of Northeast India. Two local youth per village are trained in triage and first-level medical intervention. Each Arogya Mitra treats about 50 patients per month. Presently, over 4,500 Arogya Mitras, 60% of whom are women, serve nearly a million tribals.

Sewa International is a 501 (c) (3) Hindu faith-based, nonprofit, charitable organization. All contributions are tax deductible (cash, cars, clothes, securities, etc.).

Guided by the Hindu philosophy of world peace and harmony, we serve regardless of race, religion, color, gender or nationality.





**Swami Vivekananda Medical Mission (SVMM), Kerala, India**

Sewa sponsored cataract surgeries of 40 tribals or **Vanavasis** (forest dwellers) through partner organization SVMM in Waynad district of Kerala. A thirty member dedicated medical team serves over 120,000 patients annually. The 35-bed hospital has 11 specialty clinics, a well equipped laboratory, a pharmacy, and treats over 200 outpatients daily.

**Uttarakhand Floods, India**

We mobilized \$200,000 in public donations for the marginalized affected communities in the Uttarakhand floods to fund multi-year rehabilitation projects in **sustainable agriculture, women empowerment, and vocational training**. Sewa is working with local partner organization UDAPSS, with whom immediate rescue and relief operations were carried out in one of the worst flood disasters in recent times that killed 10,000 people and left 70,000 homeless.



**Youth Internship, US and International**

Sewa International offers two youth internships annually: (i) **Get Inspired**, an eight week summer program for high school and college youth to serve local communities in select US cities. (ii) A ten-week **Yuva for Sewa Fellowship** in India and Guyana for college going youth. In addition, a host of volunteering opportunities is offered at 38 Sewa chapters spread across the US.

**Colorado Flood Relief, US**

Our volunteers along with partner organization HSS provided immediate relief to victims of Colorado floods that devastated seventeen counties spread over 2,000 sq. miles damaging over \$1 billion dollars. Bryan a beneficiary said "The team took on dirty and unglamorous tasks which allowed us to focus on the recovery of our possessions and repairing the house," adding "They were positive, sensitive and very helpful. We appreciate it, and badly needed the help."



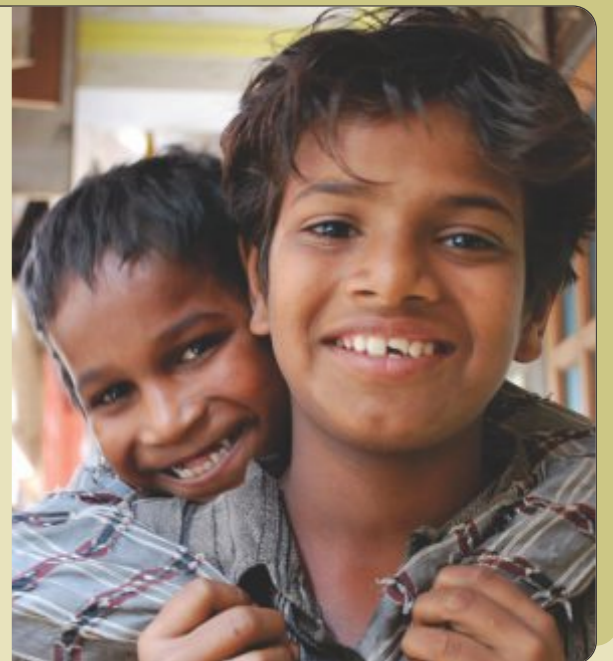
**Sewa's Tenth Anniversary**

Sewa organized a laser show 'Swamiji' in twelve US cities to commemorate Sewa's 10th anniversary that coincided with Swami Vivekananda's 150th birth anniversary. This Annual Fundraising event produced by the world-renowned laserist Manick Sorcar kept the audience captivated and spell bound, and raised \$300,000.



**Samatol Foundation, Mumbai, India**

Partnering with Samatol, four hundred runaway children found on the platforms of Mumbai railway stations were rehabilitated and reunited with their families. Rescuing these vulnerable children prevents crime, child labor, sexual abuse, addiction, trafficking, and future growth of criminals.



**Ekam Foundation, Chennai, India**

This project conducted 2,800 health-screening camps and 2,200 awareness sessions on yoga, first aid and basic life support in government schools and public spaces. Over 1,050 poor children benefitted. Ekam, a Sewa supported initiative, aims to reduce maternal, infant, childhood and adolescent mortality. A new center opened in Mumbai metro recently.

**Pakistan Flood Relief**

In a joint effort with Hindu American Foundation, USA and Harey Rama Foundation of Pakistan we distributed food essentials and warm clothing to 650 families from the minority community in five districts of Pakistan's Punjab and Sindh province who were affected by heavy monsoon rains and floods in August 2013.



**Solar Lighting, RIWATCH, Arunachal Pradesh, India**

A Sewa grant installed a 3KW solar project at Research Institute of World's Ancient Traditions, Cultures & Heritage (RIWATCH) situated in the lower Dibang valley of Arunachal Pradesh. The campus that had intermittent electricity for most part of the year now enjoys 24x7 supply of electricity and powers 31 CFL lights, 5 streetlights, 14 fans, 8 computers and 3 TVs.
